About the American with Disabilities Act (ADA)

The ADA is the law that requires the removal of barriers that deny individuals with disabilities equal access to:

- √ Jobs
- √ Public Accommodations
- √ Government Services
- √ Public Transportation
- √ Commercial Facilities
- √ Telecommunications

Title II of the ADA

Title II of the ADA applies to the operations of State and local governments.

A person with a disability is an individual who:

- Has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities.
- Has a record of such an impairment, or
- Is regarded as having an impairment.

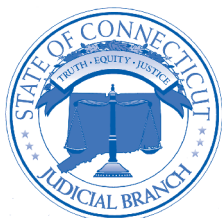
Major life activities include, but are not limited to:

(A) In general

- caring for oneself, performing manual tasks, seeing, hearing, eating, sleeping, walking, standing, lifting, bending, speaking, breathing, learning, reading, concentrating, thinking, communicating, and working.

(B) Major bodily functions

- operation of a major bodily function, including but not limited to, functions of the immune system, normal cell growth, digestive, bowel, bladder, neurological, brain, respiratory, circulatory, endocrine and reproductive functions.
